Applications for the state offices must be postmarked or emailed no later than October 1. Here are the duties and expectations for each office:

President:

7. Preside at all meetings of NASC and the Board of Directors
8. Represent NASC as needed at public occasions and functions
9. Act as NASC official representative at the annual convention of the National Association of Student Councils (if necessary). Your hotel and registration at the conference will be paid by NASC (pretrip and travel costs will be your responsibility).
10. Select and promote a state charity

Macy, an unincorporated town of about 1,550 is about 33 miles southeast of Sioux City, Iowa and about 70 miles north of Omaha, along the Missouri River. The Student Council is very excited to offer our culture, community and school as we serve as the 2010 host site for this year's NASC State Convention. Umo^{ho} Nation Student Council is proud of the rich culture, tradition, and language within our school and our tribal community. The schedule planned includes the State Executive Board Meeting, a Handgame (Omaha Tribal Social Gathering/Activity), and a Dance at the School on Sunday, November 7th. The convention on Monday, November 8th will begin with registration from 7:30 to 8:30 am and the opening session featuring a cultural exhibition of the first people of Nebraska and creators of the Hethuska, you definitely don't want to miss, immediately following will be a keynote presentation. Leadership mini-sessions, coop reunions, district meetings will be followed with a general session featuring the Make-A-Wish Foundation. The convention activities will conclude at about 3:30 p.m.

Did you know as a member school of the Nebraska Association of Student Councils, you are eligible for awards and honors? The following awards and honors applications are available on the nasc.org website. Applications must be postmarked or emailed no later than October 1.

Warren E. Schull: named for the founder of the National Association of Student Councils, is given each year to an outstanding active advisor in honor of his or her service. The state winner advances to Region V competition and is honored by the Division of Student Activities each year at the NASC National Conference.

Don Darnell: for outstanding service of a retiring adviser who has served more than 10 years.

Outstanding Principal Award: Recognizes a principal who is supportive of student leadership. It is presented to the recognized winner each year at State Convention.

All-State Student Council and Ron Joekel Scholarship: Given to a senior student in each NASC district that has exhibited outstanding leadership in their student council and has been an active participant in NASC at the district and state level. These ALL STATE winners are honored at the NASC State Convention. One of the 8 district winners is given the \$500 Ron Joekel Scholarship and a plaque. This scholarship winner will be announced at the State Convention.

Outstanding Student Council: This self-evaluation award recognizes councils that have done an exemplary job in their schools.

Nationally Certified Student Leader: Take your leadership to the next level as you work to earn national recognition as an NASC Certified Student Leader (CSL).

National Convention

"Ladies and gentlemen, start your engines!"- From June 24-29, 2010, 20 Nebraska delegates represented our state at the National Student Council Convention at Cedar Grove High School in Indianapolis, IN. We spent two days in Chicago shopping at the Miracle Mile, attending the Blue Man Group and hanging out at Six Flags Mid America.

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Team Nebraska was on of 47 programs participating in the 2010 USA National Game in Lincoln, NE, from July 18 – 23. Team Nebraska, 281 strong, arrived in Lincoln on July 17 and quickly settled into their new surroundings and tried on the uniforms they would wear for the next week. On of the most impressive, if not the most impressive, events of the week was Team Nebraska walking in at the Opening Ceremonies on Sunday, July 18. The sea of red parading in waving its Team Nebraska rally towels raised the roof of the Devaney Center as the partisan fans went wild.

Competitions began on Monday, July 19. Every one of the athletes wore the Team Nebraska red and white represented not only Special Olympics Nebraska, but also the state. By the time the games were over, Team Nebraska walked off with the following:

- 100 gold medals
- 109 silver medals
- 107 bronze medals
- 73 fourth-place ribbons
- 25 fifth-place ribbons
- 4 sixth-place ribbons
- 5 seventh-place ribbons, and
- 1 eighth-place ribbon.

Above the above awards earned, each and every Team Nebraska athlete performed to the best of his/her ability, exhibited great sportsmanship, and showed not only the state of Nebraska, but also the country what amateur sports are all about.



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Our wonderful driver Pam then negotiated rush hour traffic and got us to Indianapolis. The convention itself was full of excellent speakers, workshops, state room activities, a dinner for all of NE at a Cedar Grove senior's house, a visit and ride around the Indianapolis Motor Speedway, a leadership visit to the Indiana War Memorials, a service activity with the Boys and Girls Club of Indianapolis at the Indianapolis Children's Museum, and time spent at Indiana University/Purdue University at Indianapolis.

It was an incredible experience for all as it was the last National Student Council Convention. Next year, the format is changing and it will become the National STARS Conference including National Honor Society and National Junior Honor Society.
